

On Sunday morning, April 4, our congregation will once again celebrate the joyful news of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. And yet, as we did in 2020, we'll welcome this Easter in a different, and possibly more muted, fashion than we did in the years before the Coronavirus pandemic. We are not "back to normal" yet, and some of us can be forgiven for wondering if we ever will be.

All of this has me thinking not of the first Easter, but of the second or third Easters. Historians will tell us that the earliest recorded celebration of Easter took place in second century. We have fragments of a sermon preached by a man called Melito of Sardis that indicate that the church had begun to note Easter as a true festival and/or feast day. But that's more than a hundred years after the events described in the Gospels... and so I got to wondering – what did the church do on the FIRST anniversary of the resurrection? Clearly, they knew that Jesus had been raised; they could literally remember it having occurred. And yet there's no record of a large turnout at worship that week, or special forms to order lilies, or who was in charge of the breakfast (which certainly would NOT have included bacon!).

Here's what I think: at that point in the church's life it was important for them to simply be the church. Their numbers were small, their theology was continuing to clarify, and the application of the Gospel truth to their daily lives took precedence over ritual observance. More than that, I would imagine, is the fact that they saw their existence as precarious. Each week represented its own triumph; each assembly meant a new opportunity to proclaim the gift of life. In that way, I suspect the church was living into the words that Paul would later write to the believers in Corinth: "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." For the early church, EACH WEEK was Easter.

There are a variety of opinions as to why the church came to embrace the Easter festival in the Spring. Some folks say that the Christians were eager to distract potential converts from a Pagan ritual; others point to a dissociation with the Jewish tradition. By the time we're into the second century, history and motives are murky. But this I know: on the first anniversary of Jesus' resurrection, small groups of folks huddled in various corners of the Empire and whispered to one another, "He is risen!", and replied by saying, "He is risen indeed!"

Easter is not about the crowd and the pageantry and the fashion; it's about affirming the fact that when we are at our lowest, God meets us and sees us through. As we engage in our second Easter of the Coronavirus pandemic, may we give thanks for the fact that we have never been alone. I'm grateful to our amazing worship team and the dedicated crew of volunteers and staff who makes this ministry possible. I may not "see" you in worship this Easter, but I hope to join you there somehow!

He is risen indeed! Thanks be to God.

The Open Door


