



Sometimes when I read the Bible I get a kick out of the way that time is referenced. Some times are very specific. When Isaiah is talking about his call to ministry, he mentions that it came "in the year that King Uzziah died." Zechariah received his call "in the eighth month, in the second year of Darius."

Other times are more seasonally referenced. II Samuel 11 talks about "in the spring, when kings go off to war..." as if it's something that everyone knows. Some feasts, like Purim, are held annually, but they fall on different days because the Hebrew reckonings of dates is different than that of our Gregorian calendar.



And, of course, many of the events in the Bible happen at a time that is non-specific. "And then..." or "Sometime later..."

I'm thinking of all of these things because I can't help but describe of the major holiday of April 2022 as being "the third Easter of the pandemic." Five years ago, that phrase would have been nonsensical to anyone. And yet as you read these words, you are shaking your head and saying, "Wow, he's right. This is the third Easter of the pandemic..." By God's grace, may it be the last Easter in the pandemic – but stay tuned. We'll know more six months or a year from now.

In the meantime, I suspect that you, like me, are starting to think about some of the possibilities that are open to you in 2022 that seemed a little more remote in previous months. What does "new life" look like to you? Where has your reality changed?

The unusual story about Jesus having risen from the dead, along with some rather vague hope about life after death for each of us, seems to be the main message of Easter. Yet neither of those things, on the surface, seems to do more than scratch the surface of what the world needs right about now. Anxiety is at an all-time high; inflation has reared its ugly head; we are still grieving friends we've lost in the past couple of years. Things are hard.

New Testament scholar N. T. Wright penned, "For his first followers, when Jesus came out of the tomb on Easter morning it was the beginning of a whole new world. A world of healing and hope. This new world—visible in changed lives and a radically new community—bypassed the politicians and power brokers (much to their annoyance) and began to make waves. The movement spread rapidly, like the pandemic but with the opposite effect: people were healed, both physically and socially." (Time, 04/02/2021)

One of the reasons that the movement spread was that people found themselves attracted to, accepted in, and eager to share the gift of community. The first Jesus-followers described themselves as "neither Jew nor Greek, neither slave nor free, neither male nor female", but "one in Christ Jesus." As the days lengthen and warm, my hope and prayer is that you would find yourself immersed in the practice of such community – whether it be through intentional and regular worship, or participation in a small-group ministry, or a deliberate practice of friendship and shared time with a few special people. Let us be the community that both grows out of and points toward the reality of an empty tomb and the hope that it brings right now. I'll look for you in worship!

Friday Night Rec


